Committed to appreciating the beauty and the fallibility (quite often the same thing) of analog, emulsion-based filmmaking, the Terrible Film Festival was established by Gerald Saul for his students in 1999. Its goal, to ensure that film students always have an opportunity to experience shooting with this medium, evolved over the years to being an exploration of the unique differences of archaic media. All films today have been shot using 16mm cameras and film with the film being processed by the filmmakers by hand in buckets of chemistry. This is the 13th iteration of the festival.
