

2020-21 Budget Letter

At its meeting on May 5th, 2020, the University's Board of Governors approved an operating budget with revenues and expenditures of \$238,634,000. Due to the level of uncertainty and unpredictability around the revenues and expenses of the University as a result of COVID-19, it was decided to present a status quo budget in which we leave projected enrolments and revenues at 2019-20 levels and also maintain the budget allocations in the Faculties and units consistent with the previous year, while providing for known, unavoidable and inflationary cost increases.

The proposed 2020-21 operating budget for the University of Regina is balanced. This budget recognizes that revenues and expenses for this fiscal year will be hard to predict, and while initial enrollments look to be consistent with last year they are very fragile in this environment. It is anticipated that within the Operating Budget, we can manage any potential declines in enrolment or revenue with savings in operating costs. What is also predicted is that these revenue and expense changes will be temporary, and that they will return to pre-pandemic levels either next year or the year following. Any one-time shortfalls in revenue this year will be dealt with by adjusting expenditure levels during the 2020-21 year, closely monitoring and controlling non-permanent staffing levels, and as necessary, through carryforward.

As is our practice, this 2020-21 budget letter provides detailed information on changes to the budgets of Faculties, administrative departments, other major units, and central operations. Provincial Support

Despite very challenging economic circumstances, the Government of Saskatchewan provided a clear indication of its support for post-secondary education. For the 2020-21 fiscal year, the University's total provincial operating support is expected to increase by \$2,191,400.

- The University received a 1% economic adjustment of \$1,070,000.
- A positive shift in funding of \$540,000 from the application of the Saskatchewan Universities
 Funding Model, reflects the University of Regina's greater growth relative to the University of
 Saskatchewan in student enrolments and research funded by CIHR. This was offset by lower
 growth in graduate supervision and research funded by SSHRC and NSERC.
- There was a decrease of flow-through funding to the MacKenzie Art Gallery of \$100,000. This was the fourth and final year of reductions that now eliminates the entire transfer.
- There was a reduction in the Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunities Scholarship funding of \$12,600.
- The amount also reflects a change of \$644,000 in the treatment of funding for La Cité
 universitaire francophone whereby the regular funding committed in the University's budget
 letter from the province as well as anticipated complementary funding is budgeted. There is an

- offsetting adjustment in the expenditure budget related to La Cité. The complementary funding to be provided during 2020-21 is yet to be determined but an estimated amount has been made available to La Cité.
- Finally, an increase of \$50,000 in funding for the Bac program in the Faculty of Education has also been recorded. There is an offsetting adjustment in the expenditure budget related to this program.

Other Revenue Budget Changes

Other 2020-21 items impacting the operating revenues include the following:

- In recognition of the financial impact that COVID-19 is having on students and their families, there will be no tuition and fee increases for the 2020-21 year.
- In line with a status quo budget, we are projecting enrolments to remain static. Any revenue impact from possible enrolment declines will be absorbed in the short term with the expectation that enrolments will recover and stabilize after the COVID-19 pandemic has passed.
- The total net revenue increase from tuition and fees is budgeted at \$510,000. This total incorporates the impact of the prior year's 2.8% rate increases on the Spring and Summer semester.
- Net tuition and fee revenue from student enrolment growth in 2019-20 exceeded expectations by \$4.8 million. This amount is built into the 2020-21 operating budget, helping to ensure it is balanced.
- The contribution of the Centre for Continuing Education to the University's revenues remains relatively unchanged from prior year's actuals at \$19.5 million. This revenue is distributed through the budget to Faculties and units across campus, supporting staffing and programming in many academic areas. Profit-sharing with the Faculties will be maintained at the same levels as 2019-20. CCE will also continue its contribution to servicing the debt for the College Avenue Campus Renewal project (\$1 million in 2020-21).
- Cost recoveries in 2020-21, primarily for utilities, are budgeted to be \$780,000 lower than projected for 2019-20. With the reduced level of activity on campus during COVID-19, utilities are budgeted to be lower than they were in 2019-20. This results in lower utilities recovered from partners by \$0.31 million. In addition, the Recreation and Athletic Fee in Kinesiology has not been assessed for the Spring and Summer semester due to COVID-19 resulting in a decline in recoveries of \$0.47 million.

Table 1 from page 5 of the 2020-21 Comprehensive Budget Plan, reproduced towards the end of this document, provides a summary of the 2020-21 operating budget compared to the previous year's budget and the annualized rate of spending at year-end, reflecting changes during the 2019-20 fiscal year.

Balancing the Budget and Addressing Inflationary Costs

In Table 2 below, the columns titled "Reductions" and "Reinvestments" lists the details of operating budget changes to units. The budget provides net reinvestments of \$739,000 for inflationary cost increases and to match expenditures with directed funding changes.

Expenditure Budget Changes

The following are the changes to the expenditure budgets of academic and academic support units:

- Increase to the budgets of La Cité and the Bac of \$694,000 that corresponds with the increase in regular funding and anticipated complementary funding in provincial operating grants.
- Increase to the budget of the Centre for Continuing Education of \$175,000 for sessional teaching cost increases and increased profit sharing with the faculties on the increased spring and summer semester tuition fees.
- Reduction to the Kinesiology expenditure budget of \$471,000 to correspond with the reduction in revenue resulting from not assessing the Recreation and Athletic fee in the Spring and Summer semester.
- Teaching equipment provisions of \$200,000 each for the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Engineering and Applied Science, base-funded in the 2014-15 operating budget, are retained at the same level. Over the years, these have provided the two Faculties with \$1.4 million each for equipment renewal.
- The Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunities Scholarship budget has been reduced by \$12,600 to reflect a reduction in the SIOS funding from the government.

The following are the changes to the expenditure budgets of administrative units and University Services and Other Expenses:

- The budget for maintenance contracts in Information Services to support central research, teaching and administrative licenses and systems increases by \$208,000. The amounts budgeted for the desktop computing Evergreen program and the telephone exchange are unchanged.
- The budget for University Services and Other Expenses increases by \$568,000. This includes increases in the cost of Banking, Legal and Other Recurring Costs of \$63,000 and Administrative Leave costs of \$141,000. Space rental expenditures increase by \$81,000 and insurance costs increase by \$124,000. An additional \$9,000 in support for Canada Research Chairs is required. The University signed a contract with the MacKenzie Art Gallery to maintain the President's Art Collection and is required to increase funding by \$150,000 despite a further reduction of funding by the Province in flow through funding of \$100,000.
- Utility expenses are forecast to decrease by \$455,000 gross and \$147,000 net of recoveries. The
 decrease is a result of reduced activity on campus due to the COVID pandemic. The Utilities
 budget incorporates the increasing cost of the federal Carbon Tax: \$693,000 gross and \$352,000
 net of recoveries.

The budget also provides a total of \$5.9 million in increases to all Faculties and other operating units for contractually-committed salary adjustments and benefits of current employees. As in the past, the operating budget provides no adjustments to unit budgets for inflationary impacts on non-salary expenditures. There are a variety of minor adjustments to central expenses, such as Employment Insurance Rebate and Tuition Reimbursement to employees, to reflect recent expenditure levels.

There is no change in the treatment of Faculty and unit carryforwards.

Preventative Maintenance and Renewal (PMR)

The PMR grant from government is unchanged for 2020-21 at \$5.068 million. The allocation within the University's capital budget is also unchanged. After providing for the required debt payment of \$980,000 with respect to previous external borrowing for utilities upgrades and other capital improvements, the amount available for priority facilities projects and equipment renewal is \$4.088 million as shown in Table 3. Funding for equipment is \$588,000. Of this amount, Information Services receives \$450,000 for IT infrastructure renewal and upgrades across the campus. Facilities Management will receive \$138,000 for classroom and common space furnishings.

One-time Allocations

Table 4 contains the details of one-time allocations in this budget plan. \$940,270 of one-time expenditures will be funded.

Research items to be funded are

- Continuation of support (Year 5 of 5) for the Fedoruk Chair in Nuclear Imaging Technologies (\$30,000)
- Funding (\$44,000) for the University's share of the costs of an Equity, Diversity and Inclusion
 (EDI) Institutional Capacity-Building project (the second of a two-year commitment). This project
 received major funding through NSERC. Along with a base-budget allocation last year to the
 Research portfolio for Diversity, Inclusion and Unconscious Bias Education, these projects
 address a requirement for the University's continuing eligibility for Canada Research Chairs
 funding.

Other items funded include:

- Start-up of a University-operated Health Centre (\$200,000 to Nursing)
- The second year of an Advancement pilot project working with 3 Faculties (\$293,000)
- Start-up funds for the new Accommodations Testing Centre (\$373,270)

Looking Ahead

The 2020-21 operating budget was created to provide stability to the Faculties and administrative units on campus during a time of great uncertainty. As the full impact of the COVID 19 pandemic becomes apparent in coming months, the University will respond in a fiscally responsible manner. We will learn from this experience.

In future years, to balance the operating budget and continue to re-invest to meet pressing needs and take advantage of opportunities, we will need to continue to look carefully at our costs, find ways to manage expenditures and generate additional revenues. We must continue to examine the way we deliver our services. We are open to all suggestions that will contribute to creating a bright and sustainable future for the University of Regina.
