1. FACULTY OF ARTS

1.1 Department of Economics – Economics Major – Revision to Admission Requirements

MOTION: To revise the final admission requirements for domestic and international students intending to major in Economics, effective 202520.

Rationale:

The current admission requirement of a minimum grade of 70.0% in these courses may be very restrictive. The department would like to avoid any adverse effects this threshold may have on incoming students. Removing the threshold will set the economics requirement in line with the final admission requirements in the Faculty of Business Administration and the Faculty of Science. See below for final admission requirements in these faculties.

Note: This certificate is designed to be taken in conjunction with other University of Regina programs given the prerequisites required for some of the requirements. Some courses in the Certificate have additional prerequisites that may lengthen the time required to complete the Certificate.

Rationale:

The proposed Certificate in Museum and Heritage Studies would represent a valuable addition to the faculty's academic offerings, with significant appeal for students interested in the interdisciplinary fields of museum and archive studies. Here is a detailed rationale for this certificate:

- 1. Interdisciplinary Approach: The certificate program is inherently interdisciplinary, drawing on courses from three different departments across two faculties, this structure not only broadens the educational scope of the program but also enables students to gain diverse perspectives and skills. Courses such as "Introduction to Business", "Cultural Heritage and Politics of the Past", and various specialized workshops in museum and heritage studies combine to provide a comprehensive foundation in both the theoretical and practical aspects of museum work.
- 2. **Relevance and Demand**: The field of museum and heritage studies is increasingly important in a global context where the preservation and interpretation of cultural heritage are crucial. The program aligns with this growing need, preparing students for careers in museums, archives, and cultural institutions, where they can contribute to heritage preservation and education.
- 3. **Practical Experience**: The inclusion of an Arts Work Experience Internship (AWEI 300AA), with placement in local museums or heritage organizations, is a key feature of the program. This practical component allows students to apply academic knowledge in real-world settings, enhancing their employability and providing them with valuable networking opportunities within the museum and heritage sectors.
- 4. **Feasibility and Accessibility**: All required courses are offered at least once every academic year, ensuring that students can complete the program within a reasonable time frame without scheduling conflicts. This accessibility is crucial for attracting and retaining students, especially those who may be balancing studies with work or other commitments.
- 5. **Sustainable Enrolment**: The projection of 5-10 students completing the certificate each year indicates a targeted yet sustainable enrolment level that will allow for personalized attention and resources. This size is ideal for fostering a close-knit learning cohort while ensuring the program's viability and effectiveness.
- 6. Curricular Structure: The curriculum is thoughtfully structured to cover both the broad aspects of business management and specific technical skills in museum operations and heritage conservation. This blend equips students with a holistic view of how museums operate within their larger economic and cultural contexts.
- 7. **Strategic Alignment with University Goals**: This certificate supports the University of Regina's strategic goals of providing experiential learning and promoting interdisciplinary studies. By combining theoretical knowledge with practical experience and crossing

departmental lines, the program stands as an example of innovative post-secondary education.

Overall, the proposed Certificate in Museum and Heritage Studies is structured to prepare students for diverse roles within museums and cultural heritage sectors or relevant MA-level studies in those areas. It reflects an understanding of current and future educational needs and aligns with the University of Regina's mission to deliver impactful, career-oriented education.

Students with high school graduation averages between 60.00-69.99% will be admitted to the Faculty of Arts and required to complete the Arts Qualifying Year in their first two terms, as follows:

To proceed to Term 2, students must successfully complete and pass each requirement in Term 1. Failure to do so will result in the student being required to discontinue from studies in the Faculty of Arts for a minimum of three terms.

To successfully complete the Arts Qualifying Year, students must:

- Receive a 50% (pass) in ACAD 100 or RDWT 120, ENGL 100, and all other courses completed in the program;
- Receive a "P" (pass) in ARTS 099; and
- Receive a "P" (pass) in SSW ACT in both terms.

Unsuccessful completion of the Arts Qualifying Year will result in the student being required to discontinue studies in the Faculty of Arts for a minimum of three terms. Students who have completed the Arts Qualifying Year will not be accepted to the Academic Recovery Program (ARP) in the Faculty of Arts in future terms.

Students applying to the Faculty of Arts with a high school final admission average between 60.0% - 69.0% may be admitted as an Arts Qualifying student if they meet all other Faculty of Arts admission requirements stated in the Undergraduate Calendar.

Students who are admitted to the Faculty of Arts with qualifying status will have the following conditions placed on them:

- The student may register in a maximum of 12.0 credit hours per term, and;
- The student must meet with a Faculty of Arts or Federated College Academic Advisor prior to registration for the duration of the program.

Arts Qualifying students will be reviewed each term. Qualifying status will be removed, and a student will be changed to "fully qualified" status if at the end of 24.0 credit hours the student has achieved a minimum UGPA of 60.0%. Arts Qualifying students who do not meet the minimum UGPA of 60.0% by the end of 24.0 credit hours will be required to withdraw from the university for a minimum of three terms.

Rationale:

The Arts Qualifying Year (AQY) went into effect in 202120. The goal of the AQY was to ensure our commitment to accessibility to higher education by providing a route into our programs for students with a final high school admission average between 60.0%-69.0%. Over the past three years the numbers have

shown that the AQY acts more as a barrier than as an access point to Arts programs. In particular, students in the original program were required to discontinue their studies if they failed a single one of their courses in their first two terms at the U of R, precluding them from finding their feet and allowing for a mistake early on. The proposed AQY, which is modeled after similar programs in the Faculties of Business and Science, parallels Academic Probation regulations where the goal is overall improvement as reflected in the student's UGPA. Students in the program also reported that they did not find the support programs offered through the original helpful, which may be because they are aimed primarily at students who already have university experience. The proposed AQY intends to provide more individualized support and advice by making regular advising mandatory while students are in the program.

2. FACULTY OF MEDIA, ART, AND PERFORMANCE

2.1 Diploma in Creative Technologies – Change of Name

MOTION: To change to name of the Diploma in Creative Technologies to the Diploma in Creative Technologies and Design, effective 202520.

Rationale:

The addition of Design to the title of the diploma recognizes both program areas that are covered in the diploma. This will also assist with translation of the diploma as it relates to the Creative Technologies (CTCH) and Design (DES) offerings, including the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts, and Minor in CTCH, and the Bachelor of DES.

2.2 Department of Creative Technologies and Design – Department Renaming

MOTION: That the program area currently titled Creative Technologies and Design become the Department of Creative Technologies and Design, effective 202520.

Rationale:

The rationale for this transition stems from the following key factors: growth and expansion of the program offerings; increased enrolment in the area; efficient and manageable administration of the programs including supervising instructors and facilitating the necessary program resources, as well as consistency across the major areas of MAP; and support and mentorship of Creative Technologies & Design faculty.

Growth and Expansion of the Program Offerings:

In the past year, Creative Technologies and Design have grown from offering a major, minor, and concentrations, to include a BFA, diploma, and the first 2+2 bachelor's degree in design. This year we are proposing three additional concentrations (Sound and Audio Recording; Visual Communication Design; User Experience and Interaction Design).

Increased Enrolment for Creative Technologies & Design:

The enrolments for Creative Technologies and Design are 106 students (Fall 2024 Registered) compared to 84 students (Winter 2024 registered) with large increases in the CTCH major, which is 50 students (Fall 2024 Registered) from 28 students (Winter 2024 registered); the New Diploma in Creative Technologies and Design has 19 students (Fall 2024 Registered) from 2 students (Winter 2024 registered). We are expecting a continued increase in the diploma, majors and substantial growth in the new Bachelor of Design now that we have signed the articulation agreement with Sask Polytech and their diploma like ours, is the ladder for the degree.

Support and Management of Area; Consistency Across the Faculty:

With the expansion of the program offerings, the rise in enrolments across the CTCH & DES programs, as well as the increase in the number of course offerings and sections, transitioning to a Department, including all of the administration, policy, and mandates, facilitates a much more supported and efficient management structure for the area, which will also make it consistent with the other four areas of MAP.

Changing from Program Coordinator to a Department Head:

Changing the status of the Program Coordinator to a Department Head acknowledges the expansion of duties and key responsibilities necessary for supporting the expanding area. This includes managing the necessary teaching resources and specialized equipment for the program offerings, as well as supporting, mentoring, and supervising the teaching team needed for the increasing number of courses and sections due to rising enrolments (including faculty, sessional instructors, and Teaching Assistants).

Additionally, becoming a department facilitates a person with more expertise in the area as the initial reviewer for performance review processes. Currently, with only a program coordinator, the role of first reviewer falls to the Associate Dean Undergraduate in MAP. Overall, having a Department Head to take on these duties, as well as the responsibility to mentor faculty through the processes, is another significant rationale for the transition. Currently, the area consists of four junior untenured faculty members, and one member at the rank of full professor who is the program coordinator.

The difference in the stipend is the only additional cost.

Restrictions on Transfer

Applicants wishing to transfer to the Faculty of Nursing SCBScN program from another faculty or wishing admission from another post-secondary institution must apply to the program and meet admission requirements as per Readmission, Faculty/College Transfer and Second Programs under the Admission section of this Calendar. Transfer applicants who are registered in post-secondary courses at the time of admission, may be granted conditional acceptance; however, final admission will be contingent on meeting the final admission requirements. Transfer applicants with a University of Regina UGPA below 65.00%, or who are on Faculty level or University level probation will not be considered for admission.

Rationale:

Students in a nursing program must maintain an overall PGPA of at least 65.00%. Students admitted with a UGPA below 65.00% are immediately at risk of being placed on faculty or university probation. This places students at risk of not being successful in the program. If there is a delay in a faculty assessing University Academic Probation (UAP) or if they have not completed the minimum 9 credit hours to be placed on UAP, without this clarification, they may still be admitted with a UGPA as low as 40.00%. Ensuring students admitted to the nursing program have a minimum UGPA of 65.00% provides them with a better chance of being successful.

4.1 Course Sequencing – Undergraduate Calendar Revision

Course Sequencing

A 100 level course, with the exception of MATH 124, may not be repeated or taken for credit if credit has been received for a higher level course in the same discipline, nor may a course be repeated or taken for credit if it is a prerequisite for a course in the same discipline for which credit has previously been obtained.

Eliminating the sequencing rule will remove ambiguity for repeating courses. University policies regarding the number of repeats allowed control how many times a student tries to take a course.

Evaluation of Academic Performance

In addition to the University Regulations in the <u>Academic Regulations</u> section, the following faculty regulations apply to all students registered in the Faculty of Science. See the Academic Regulations section for descriptions of the different types of GPA referred to in this section.

Dean's Honours List

To be named to the Dean's Honours List, students must attain an average of at least 85.00% in a given term on a minimum of 15 credit hours (12 credit hours during spring/summer term) of numerically graded courses.

Probation and Discontinuance

Academic Probation

Students who do not maintain good academic standing will be placed on university-level academic probation. Students on university-level academic probation are permitted to continue studies and may transfer faculties, if they meet the entrance requirements of another faculty.

To clear university-level academic probation, students must raise their UGPA to a minimum of 60% by the time they complete 24 credit hours while on university-level academic probation. The Faculty of Science may extend the probation period up to an additional 15 credit hours if students achieve at least a 60% average over all credit hours completed while on university-level academic probation.

Students on university-level academic probation are permitted to continue their studies; however, students are limited to enrolling in a maximum of 12 credit hours per semester in Fall and Winter, and a maximum of 9 credit hours in the Spring and Summer terms. If a student takes 9 credit hours in the Spring and Summer semester, those 9 credit hours must not be concentrated in one of the Spring or Summer term.

The Science Academic Hub audits students' academic performance after each semester. Letters are sent to the student's U of R email address in May, September, and January to students who are placed on university-level academic probation.

Mandatory Withdrawal

The Faculty of Science follows University regulations regarding the academic situation in which a student must withdraw (MW) from their studies. Included among these is the failure to clear university-level academic probation. Students who do not clear university-level academic probation must withdraw from the University for a minimum of one year.

Students who must withdraw from their studies are notified in writing by the Science Academic Hub through letters sent to the student's U of R email address in May, September, or January. When MWs are assessed, they are effective on the first day of the term immediately following the term for which the notification letter was issued.

Students may appeal an MW assessment, but must do so before the deadlines indicated in their letters. Appeals received by the deadline are addressed within the term; late appeals will not be addressed.

Students who have been forced to withdraw from their studies must apply to be readmitted to the Faculty. The decision of the Faculty on such applications is final and cannot be appealed. Students who are readmitted may have conditions placed upon them.

Students who fail more than 50% of their credit hours in a single term receive a letter of academic advisement. The letter indicates the implications of continued failure and encourages students to seek academic advising. This regulation does not apply to students who register for three credit hours or fewer in the term. The letter is not recorded on the official transcript.

In the review of students' performance, students who have failed a course and whose records contain failed courses totaling more than 30 credit hours are required to discontinue their studies in the Faculty for two terms.

Note: The 30 credit hour limit includes failed courses which are repeated and later passed. The failed courses which lead to a student's being required to discontinue for two terms will be excluded from the calculation of failures in subsequent reviews of accumulated performance.

Requirement to Discontinue

Students will be required to discontinue from their current program for failure to meet a program requirement or for a second failure in a mandatory course for the program.

Students may be required to discontinue from the Faculty of Science for failure to meet a Faculty of Science requirement or for a second failure in a mandatory course.

Students may be required to discontinue (RTD) from their current program for failure to meet a program requirement (such as maintaining the required minimum program GPA) or for repeated failure in a mandatory course requirement. If eligible for another program in the Faculty of Science, students who are RTD from one program may apply to transfer to another program. Students who are not eligible to transfer to another Science program will be required to discontinue from the Faculty of Science.

Students who have previously been required to discontinue (RTD) under any faculty's regulations or forced to withdraw from the University (MW), including those of the Faculty of Science, and who are again required to discontinue under one of these regulations, will be required to discontinue indefinitely from the Faculty.

On the recommendation of the Faculty Committee on Admissions and Studies, the Faculty may also require students to discontinue indefinitely from the Faculty of Science for reasons of health or unsatisfactory academic or professional development.

Students who have been required to discontinue (RTD) from the Faculty of Science are not permitted to register in any Science course without written permission of the Associate Dean (Academic) of the Faculty of Science. Science courses taken without permission of the Associate Dean (Academic) of the Faculty of Science, while on RTD from the Faculty of Science, at any institution or in any other Faculty at the University of Regina, will not be transferable for credit to a degree program in Science.

All rulings of probation or discontinuance may be appealed in writing to the Faculty; see the <u>Other Faculty</u> <u>Regulations</u> section.

Academic Recovery Program

The Academic Recovery Program (ARP) is a skills development program offered by the Student Success Centre (SSC) for students who are experiencing difficulties in their studies. Acceptance to the ARP is through application to SSC and approval of the SSC Intake Advisor and the Faculty of Science. A student who has an MW or RTD status and has been

accepted to the ARP will have their MW or RTD status put on hold until the ARP has been successfully completed. Upon completion of the ARP, the Faculty of Science will reassess the MW or RTD status, which may or may not result in a change of status. In the Faculty of Science, students who have a UGPA of less than 55% will not be approved for the ARP.

Rationale:

To clarify the processes of Academic Probation, Mandatory Withdrawal, Requirement to Discontinue, and Academic Recovery Program within the Faculty of Science to assist with student understanding.

4.3 Faculty of Science Academic Advising and Registration – Undergraduate Calendar Revision

MOTION: To revise the academic advising and registration section with the Faculty of Science's section of the Undergraduate Calendar, effective 202520.

P. 288, 2024-25 Undergraduate Calendar

Academic Advising and Registration

Through advising, the Faculty can communicate to our students the various programs that are offered within the Faculty, the opportunities available following successful completion, and general academic requirements, as well as assist with how to navigate the University of Regina policies and how to plan a program of study consistent with both degree requirements and individual interests.

The requirements for the various credentials are set out in the following pages. Notwithstanding advice given by faculty members, students who have questions concerning their degree requirements should consult the staff at the Science Academic Hub who will consult with the Associate Dean (Academic) as necessary.

Students register according to a priority system in which those who have earned the most credit hours register first. Students are encouraged to register online. Registration assistance is available online, by e-mail, and in person at the Science Academic Hub, (see General Information section).

Academic Advising

Academic advising is designed to help students understand their program of study and build an academic program tailored to their interests and goals. The Faculty of Science academic advising team and staff in the Science Academic Hub are available to assist students with a variety of questions. Students are encouraged to prepare for their meetings with academic advisors by reviewing program requirements and course options. Students should consult an academic advisor during their first year of study and again prior to graduation.

Registration

Students are responsible for ensuring that their program requirements and other academic regulations are met. Online registration does not prevent students from registering in courses that do not apply for their certificate, diploma, or degree program, or for courses for which they have not met the prerequisite(s). Students requiring registration assistance should visit the Science Academic Hub (LB 238).

Course Load

The maximum course load in the Faculty of Science is 15 credit hours in each of fall and winter terms, and 12 credit hours in spring/summer terms.

Students may not register for more than 15 credit hours in fall or winter term, or more than 12 credit hours in spring/summer. To be eligible for consideration for a course overload, students must have successfully completed 30 credit hours and unless they have a UGPA of at least 75.00% or a TGPA of at least 75.00% in the most recent term. The approval of the Associate Dean (Academic) is required to register for an overload.

Students who have been accepted to co-operative education programs who have a scheduled academic study term in spring/summer may register for 15 credit hours with the permission of their departmental co-op coordinator the Associate Dean (Academic).

Prerequisites

Students are responsible for ensuring that they have the required prerequisite(s) before taking a course. Students who fail a course that is a prerequisite for one in which they are already registered must make appropriate changes to their registration.

Rationale:

The changes provide more direct language on what advising is and inform students of their responsibilities.

4.4 Residency and Transfer Credit – Undergraduate Calendar Revision

MOTION: To revise the Residency and Transfer Credit section to include Letter of Permission regulations in the Faculty of Science section of the Undergraduate Calendar.

P. 288, 2024-25 Undergraduate Calendar

Residency and Transfer Credit

A maximum of 60 credit hours of eligible transfer credit may be applied to a degree program, 30 credit hours of eligible transfer credit to a diploma program, and 15 credit hours of eligible transfer credit to a certificate program, unless otherwise stated. The Certificate in Foundations of Science allows no more than 9.0 credit hours of transfer credit. Students must take at least 15 of the last 30 credit hours of their degree program at the University of Regina. As well, at least half the credit hours of required discipline courses for the major and/or minor must be completed at the University of Regina.

Letter of Permission

Current students in the Faculty of Science may complete courses at other recognized post secondary institutions only if they obtain permission in advance. They are required to meet with a Science academic advisor to ensure their eligibility and that the courses contribute to their program. Students must be in good academic and financial standing at the time of the request. Good academic standing means that the student has the minimum UGPA, PGPA, and Major GPA required to graduate from their program. Good financial standing means that there are no financial holds on a student's account that would preclude registrations at the University of Regina.

In addition to being in good academic and financial standing, requests for a Letter of Permission to take a credit course at another postsecondary institution will be considered only if the student:

- has completed the appropriate prerequisite for the credit to be granted at the University of Regina
- has not already passed the course at the University of Regina
- provides a written statement explaining the need to take the course at another institution.

Notes:

- Courses successfully completed at the University of Regina cannot be repeated at another institution for transfer credit.
- Poor academic performance on courses completed elsewhere may result in the Faculty of Science denying the student subsequent permission to take courses elsewhere for credit.
- Courses taken on a letter of permission count toward the course load maximum.
- Students must not register for courses at another institution without first receiving a formal Letter of Permission from the Faculty of Science approving the request.
- The Faculty of Science reserves the right to deny requests to take a course for credit at another institution.
- No transfer credit is accepted towards the University of Regina portion of joint Saskatchewan Polytechnic-University of Regina degree programs.
- The Faculty of Science awards transfer credit for courses taken at other institutions only if the grade received was 60% or higher or equivalent.

The Faculty of Science does not accept ACAD 100, UNIV 100, UNIV 101 and/or UNIV 110; AMTH 001, 091, 002, 092 and/or 003; PMTH 091, 092; Science 101 and 105, RDWT 120, KIN 101 or courses numbered 0xx for credit toward any program in the Faculty of Science.

The proposed Certificate in Museum and Heritage Studies would represent a valuable addition to the faculty's academic offerings, with significant appeal for students interested in the interdisciplinary fields of museum and archive studies. It reflects an understanding of current and future educational needs and aligns with the University of Regina's mission to deliver impactful, career-oriented education. The field of museum and heritage studies is increasingly important in a global context where the preservation and interpretation of cultural heritage are crucial. The program aligns with this growing need, preparing students for careers in museums, archives, and cultural institutions, where they can contribute to heritage preservation and education.

- 2. What are the key objectives and/or goals of this program and how will it be delivered?
 - 1. Interdisciplinary Approach: The certificate program is inherently interdisciplinary, drawing on courses from three different departments across two faculties, this structure not only broadens the educational scope of the program but also enables students to gain diverse perspectives and skills. Courses such as "Introduction to Business", "Cultural Heritage and Politics of the Past", and various specialized workshops in museum and heritage studies combine to provide a comprehensive foundation in both the theoretical and practical aspects of museum work.
 - 2. Relevance and Demand: The field of museum and heritage studies is increasingly important in a global context where the preservation and interpretation of cultural heritage are crucial. The program aligns with this growing need, preparing students for careers in museums, archives, and cultural institutions, where they can contribute to heritage preservation and education.
 - 3. Practical Experience: The inclusion of an Arts Work Experience Internship (AWEI 300AA), with placement in local museums or heritage organizations, is a key feature of the program. This practical component allows students to apply academic knowledge in real-world settings, enhancing their employability and providing them with valuable networking opportunities within the museum and heritage sectors.
 - 4. Feasibility and Accessibility: All required courses are offered at least once every academic year, ensuring that students can complete the program within a reasonable timeframe without scheduling conflicts. This accessibility is crucial for attracting and retaining students, especially those who may be balancing studies with work or other commitments.

- 5. Sustainable Enrolment: The projection of 5-10 students completing the certificate each year indicates a targeted yet sustainable enrolment level that will allow for personalized attention and resources. This size is ideal for fostering a close-knit learning cohort while ensuring the program's viability and effectiveness.
- Curricular Structure: The curriculum is thoughtfully structured to cover both the broad aspects of business
 management and specific technical skills in museum operations and heritage conservation. This blend equips
