### **CONGRATULATIONS!**

Denae Easton successfully defended her Honours Thesis! Read about Denae's RDC project, *The Relationship between Childhood Victimization and Dating Violence in Canada: An Analysis of the General Social Survey Cycle 34, 2019*, below:

Re-victimization in intimate partner violence situations may occur due to the cyclical nature of violence. Previously, the link between childhood maltreatment and intimate partner violence has been well-researched in the literature. However, there has not been as much research on the relationship between childhood abuse and dating violence, especially in adolescents. In the present study, we used data from the General Social Survey (GSS) cycle 34 - Canadians' Safety (2019) to analyze the relationship between experiencing childhood abuse and becoming a victim of dating violence. The purpose of this project was to examine what factors appear to be associated with dating violence in adolescence and young adulthood. The current study sought to address two principal research questions. The first is: What negative childhood experiences may be contributing to dating violence? This can be divided into a typology of: a) emotional abuse, b) physical abuse, c) sexual abuse, and d) witnessing violence. The second is: Are there other factors that may contribute to dating violence? This includes gender differences, neighbourhood conditions, substance use, and mental health issues. To explore significant relationships among variables, we conducted cross-tabulations, independent samples t-tests, Pearson correlations, as well as multiple and logistic regression models. The findings and implications of this study are discussed.

Angèle Poirier won 1st Place and the Policy Pitch awards at the 2022 CRDCN National Policy Challenge! Her presentation, *What Motivates Recreational Cannabis Consumption in Canada?*, used data from the Survey of Household Spending (SHS) and the National Cannabis Survey (NCS). # **NEW DATASETS IN THE RDC**

#### **CANADIAN COMMUNITY HEALTH SURVEY 2019-2020**

The central objective of the **Canadian Community Health Survey** (<u>CCHS</u>) is to gather health-related data at the sub-provincial levels of geography (health region or combined health regions).

#### **CANADIAN HEALTH SURVEY ON SENIORS 2019-2020**

The **Canadian Health Survey on Seniors** (CHSS) is a supplement to the Canadian Community Health Survey (CCHS) - Annual component. It collects information related to health status, health care services, supports, as well as social and health determinants for the Canadian population aged 65 and over.

#### **EXECUTIVE WORK AND HEALTH SURVEY 2021 New Survey**

The **Executive Work and Health Survey** (**EWHS**) provides an assessment of individual and organizational health measures as well as the work environment for federal executives.

#### HATE CRIME POLICING INDCIDENT PROFILE New Survey

The **Hate Crime Policing Incident Profile (HCPIP)** files are the first set of files produced for this Canadian-Sweden Research Collaboration on Organized Violent Threats. To develop the HCPIP files, which identify a cohort of individuals that were involved in police-reported hate crime incidents that occurred between 2011 and 2018, incidents from the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) survey were flagged using the hate crime indicator. Unique person identifiers were then created to identify individuals involved in crimes and then all previous and subsequent police-reported incidents of those involved in hate crimes were included.

#### IMPACTS OF COVID-19 ON CANADIANS—TESTING AND VACCINATION New Survey

The Impacts of COVID-19 on Canadians - Testing and Vaccination (ICC-TV) collects data on experiences with testing for COVID-19, particularly with using rapid tests. This information will help assess the rate of athome COVID-19 testing, access to rapid testing kits in Canada and vaccination status.

#### SURVEY ON SAVINGS FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES 2020 New Survey

The purpose of the **Survey on Savings for Persons with Disabilities** (<u>SSPD</u>) is to gather information about the knowledge and behaviours of Canadians with disabilities and their caregivers with regard to savings.

#### **CANADIAN TOBACCO AND NICOTINE SURVEY 2021**

The main objective of the **Canadian Tobacco and Nicotine Survey** (**CTNS**) is to gather information about the prevalence of cigarette smoking, vaping, and cannabis use.
