ACADEMIC UNIT REVIEW SELF STUDY REPORT

1. BACKGROUND

The Department of Politics and International Studies (PAIS) was formed in 2014 when the Department of Political Science and the International Studies program merged organizationally while maintaining two distinct undergraduate programs. The Department is also one of the partners in the Philosophy, Politics, and Economics interdisciplinary program. Several of its faculty have adjunct appointments at the Johnson-Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy (JSGS). It currently has eight tenured or tenure track faculty members, 2.5 members in term positions, 2 sessional members with preference (in addition to a number of other sessional faculty members), and a department administrator. In 2020-21, PAIS members in the Faculty of Arts will move from a 4.5 course/year teaching load to a 4 course load. It is proudly interdisciplinary and has faculty members with PhDs in Political Science, History, and Anthropology. This is the first time that either the department or its predecessor units have been externally reviewed.

PAIS is emerging from a period of very substantial staffing transition, as the period between January 2018 and July 2019 saw one senior member (Nilgun Onder) promoted to Associate Vice-President (Academic), the hiring of Allyson Stevenson as a Canada Research Chair Tier II in Indigenous Peoples and Global Social Justice, and the hiring of two other tenure track members (Arjun Tremblay and Marta Bashovksi) and three term appointments (Yun Liu, Brian McQuinn, and Emily Merson). Much of this hiring was to replace a number of very productive tenure and tenure track members: Joyce Green (long term disability since 2011), Shadia Drury (retired 2014, emerita 2014-), and Yuchao Zhu (retired 2019, emeritus 2019-); as well as Lee Ward and Anne Ward who left for Baylor University in 2017. Of necessity, this means the ten-year retrospective framework envisioned in the unit review guidelines can only be loosely followed in this document.

The Department has enjoyed gradually growing enrollments compared with other units in the Faculty of Arts and, over the past couple of years, has seen a strong rebound in enrollment in its two honours programs. No other unit specifically requires either IS 100 or PSCI 100, meaning that the 'service teaching' the unit does is delivered to students who are opting into these courses rather than specifically being required to take them. In 2018-19, the Department conducted a review of the International Studies concentration. As a result of this review, it moved from offering four concentrations in the degree (International Affairs, Development Studies, Asian Studies, and European Studies) to two (International Affairs and Development Studies) and generally simplified degree requirements. These changes will take effect for the fall of 2020. The Political Science program was lightly restructured in 2014-15, but was last thoroughly reviewed in 2009-10.

The Department once had a MA program in Political Science but admissions to it have been suspended since 2010. PAIS has focussed on its undergraduate programs since the closure of the MA program in Social and Political Thought in 2019 (the program had suspended admissions for some time before that after the retirement of Shadia Drury). These departures were partly the result of faculty departures from the Department, but were also a response to the growth and success of graduate programming at JSGS.

3. SCHOLARLY OUTPUT

3.1.1. Summary

PAIS does not have formal research clusters internally and has focussed its planning on having a distribution of faculty that can offer two coherent undergraduate programs who are also good researchers.

McIntosh has played a leading role in the Saskatchewan Population Health and Evaluation Research Unit (SHERU) from the beginning of his appointment and is Special Advisor to the VP (Research) for the University's 'Integrated Human Health: Equity, Disease, and Prevention' cluster. Farney and Stevenson are tied to the University's 'Living Heritage' research cluster. And many of the Department's students have been active in the Faculty's Community Research Unit's programs.

The department has cross-cutting areas of strength in historically orientated research (Stevenson, Farney, and Tremblay), ethnography (Granovsky-Larsen and McQuinn), community based research (Stevenson, McIntosh, Granovsky-Larsen, and McQuinn), narrative politics (Bashovski and Merson), and interdisciplinary approaches to international relations (Hewson, Onder, Liu, and McQuinn).

Taken as a unit, PAIS has enjoyed growth in the number of credit hours that it teaches and has held the number of majors at a stable level. Given the turmoil in its staffing over the last few years its continued ability to attract majors is significant.

This does, though, mask two quite different stories at the program level. International Studies has greatly increased the number of credit hours it offers even as the number of majors it has attracted has declined. Political Science has remained roughly stable in the number of credit hours offered while its number of majors has increased (this is likely due to the growth of the Philosophy, Politics, and Economics Program which is lumped in with PSCI majors). International Studies majors are markedly more female, noticeably less Indigenous, and markedly more international than Political Science majors.

The vast bulk of the Department's budget is tied to these permanent positions. From the Faculty of Arts budget it draws funding for roughly five TA and one to three sessional stipends a year. From the Centre of Continuing Education budget it funds one to three TA and six to nine sessional stipends. It has a small discretionary budget that supports one or two visiting speakers a year, funds three small undergraduate scholarships, and is sometimes able to provide travel support for undergraduates attending conferences.

7. SWOT ANALYSIS (STRENGTHS, WEAKNESSES, OPPORTUNITIES, THREATS)

Strength, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats

Eight members of PAIS Faculty met on January 15 for a facilitated half day of deliberation to draft the department's SWOT (one additional written submission was made). The draft of the SWOT was circulated and collectively edited in Google docs. The final draft was approved at a department meeting on February 5. This is consciously a 'present state' document – PAIS commits to developing a forward looking strategic plan once the Department has received the external reviewers' report and the University's strategic plan has been finalized.

STRENGTHS:

Organizationally: PAIS has a diverse and dynamic faculty and a welcoming and positive departmental culture. It incorporates both academic and practitioner perspectives. Having International Studies and Political Science in the same department creates positive synergies. It has a young faculty complement and, so, is able to plan for long term. There is a shared, principled, commitment to Indigenization and the presence of a Canada Research Chair in Indigenous Peoples and Global Social Justice is important in this regard. Though it is small, it is able to offer a good undergraduate program in both Political Science and International Studies. It has recently streamlined the International Studies program and has collaborative relationships with the Department of History, the Johnson-Shoyama School of Public Policy, and the Political Studies Department at the University of Saskatchewan.

Teaching: There is a widely held commitment to undergraduate teaching on the part of the faculty and engaged and hardworking students in all stages of both programs. Interdisciplinarity works well (both in terms of co-operation inside the department and in co-operation with other departments). It has strong enrollment patterns and is comparatively successful in converting students in introductory courses into majors. Generally speaking, it has small classes. The language requirements in the International Studies program are seen as a strength, as are the offering of all introductory classes in online versions.

Research: Partly because of rules at the Faculty of Arts level and partly because of departmental practice, PAIS enjoys an inclusive definition of what counts as research. This has allowed Faculty members to pursue opportunities across disciplinary boundaries. Faculty members have demonstrated strong research performance/output and there is strong research support for early career faculty (i.e. the Research Office's SSHRC Cohort program). Community engaged research and community service is recognized.

WEAKNESSES:

Organizational: The department recognizes that recent hires have made it more diverse, but also that there is still a gender imbalance amongst its permanent faculty. Three of its faculty members are currently on term appointments and the department has, in the recent past, been very dependent on sessional faculty to deliver its programs. Though there is a shared recognition of

Indigenization as an important principle, the Department's relationships with First Nations communities and First Nations University are very limited and it has few self-identified Indigenous students. There are quite different ways of understanding the framework of Indigenization (and of the related topic of decolonization) that should be worked through. PAIS is not very effective at external communications (e.g. its website) and does not engage with its alumni in a coherent way. There is limited usable data to guide curricular decisions and it exists in a Faculty and a University with a relatively weak external reputation.

Teaching: At the department level, the curriculum could be much more coherent. For example, there is no shared sense of which skills, assignments, theories, or topics students will know after completing a given year of study. The lack of specific pre-requisites makes teaching upper year classes difficult and not having tutorials for junior level classes sometimes make teaching those courses challenging. Faculty are not involved in student advising and the student association has struggled to be consistently active. There is a lack of suitable rooms for seminars. Though important to the delivery of the program, sessionals are in a difficult situation. Faculty level registration and class cancellation policies mean that classes are often cancelled not long in advance of term. Students seem uninterested in classes on Indigenous topics. A lack of a clear regional studies focus in the International Studies could be understood as a weakness. As the Department offers a limited number of upper year courses it is sometimes difficult for students to complete their degrees if they are working full time.

Research: The lack of a graduate program makes winning grants more difficult. Though it has improved recently, there are relatively few visiting scholars and it is difficult to build connections with schools outside the UofR.

OPPORTUNITIES:

Organizational: There are nascent partnerships with other units (USASK POLS, JSGS, History) that offer the opportunity to share in graduate teaching and have research assistants. Connections to the community and undeveloped relationships with alumni suggest potential fundraising opportunities. The small size of the department makes interdisciplinarity an easy and natural enterprise and the collegial governance of the University is strong. Indigenization offers opportunities across the Department's activities. The Faculty of Arts is, presently, in a good financial situation which makes pursuing good ideas more possible.

Teaching: The increasing prominence of international students and topics at university offers significant enrollment and recruiting opportunities, as does the general increase of student interest in political topics. Combined with the growth of UR International, the Department may well be able to play a key role in the development of intercultural competencies amongst students. The honours program is successfully being rejuvenated and this momentum can hopefully be maintained. There may be a beneficial partnership with the Non-Profit Leadership Program. The department needs to decide whether an emphasis on its existing undergraduate programs or a re-entry into graduate teaching offers the most promising path.

Research: Members of the department are successfully building a good deal of research momentum and there is real success to be celebrated. Research funding opportunities seem to be increasing and UR International is increasingly supporting faculty exchange initiatives.

THREATS:

Organizational: Competition from JSGS School of Public Policy has made a graduate program a difficult proposition. The Faculty of Arts and the University are undergoing a significant leadership changes and the University's place in the Maclean's rankings has been in gradual decline for some time. The Faculty may be losing one of its largest departments to another Faculty, potentially triggering significant budget and governance changes. The department is not connected with alumni nor with Indigenous communities. As a small department without a graduate program, faculty retention is always a concern. The University of Regina is more dependent than most Canadian universities on government funding, making it particularly vulnerable to broader political changes.

Teaching: Low enrollments in some areas (e.g. Indigenous topics) and staffing in others (e.g. gender) has made it difficult to move the curriculum in some important directions. Being part of a Faculty of Arts sometimes makes it difficult to attract students and may lead to a perception of career problems for graduates of the department. Centralized advising might create problems for some students and limit the department's engagement with changing student demographics. Our students face significant financial challenges to the timely completion of their degree which may, in turn, limit their satisfaction with their degrees.

Research: There is a lack of understanding at the faculty/university level about Indigenous research practices and barriers to accessing funding for it based on lack of support at the faculty level. The overall increased competition for grant dollars risks lowering the success rate of applications which might discourage continued applications from more junior scholars. The university's research support infrastructure is improving but still lags behind what is needed.
