- Approved Education electives must be senior level (200level or above) in the Faculty of Education. A list of approved senior courses is available from Student Services in the Faculty of Education.
- In order to pass ECS 311, students must also pass EFLD-318.

Rationale: The proposed changes to the Elementary Program reflect the beginning of a renewed vision of pre-service teacher education. Some longstanding traditions have been let go, and other new innovations have been adopted. ECCU 400 Treaties in the Classroom will be a required course in the Program, a first concrete step taken to align with the Faculty of Education's response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Calls to Action. ECS 311 is the anchor course in Pedagogy, theory and practice. The aesthetic education requirement will now be delivered in co-operation with the Arts Education program. More minor changes are consistent with the overall goal of providing students with accurate, accessible information in the calendar.

**Rationale:** The proposed changes to the Two-Year Elementary After-degree (BEAD) Program reflect the beginning of a renewed vision of pre-service teacher education. Similar to the 4 year degree, ECS 311 is the anchor course in Pedagogy, theory and practice, and the aesthetic education degree requirement is now delivered in conjunction with the Arts Education Program.

#### 2.1 French and Francophone Intercultural Studies Program

#### Motion 3: Change to the BA with a major in French and Francophone Intercultural Studies

That the students completing their BA with a major in French and Francophone Intercultural Studies be permitted to take FRN 352 or ENGL 100, effective 201920.

#### Current course description:

#### FRN 352 — Lecture et écriture critique I/ Critical Reading and Writing I

This course develops students' proficiency in critical reading and writing through the study of a wide range of non-literary and literary texts, and the study of composition, with emphasis on connections between modes of reading and writing.

Prerequisite: FRN301 or permission from the program.

\*Note: This course replaces ENGL 100 only for students registered in the Bilingual Option of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing. These students cannot claim credits for both FRN 352 and ENGL 100.\*

Program requirements: (page 305 online calendar/page 296 print calendar)

#### Bachelor of Arts (BA) - Major In French and Francophone Intercultural Studies

The BA is a four-year, 120 credit hours degree consisting of a set of core requirements (designed to achieve breadth), one or two majors (to achieve depth), and electives (free choices). Minors are optional. Students are allowed to count a maximum of 48 credit hours of introductory level courses towards their program.

The French Major requires 39 credit hours (13 courses), with at least 15 credit hours at the 300- or 400-level. Combined majors have a minimum of 60 credit hours (20 courses).

**Note**: FRN 100, 101, 110, and 200 do not count towards a French major or minor, but each receives degree program credit.

#### \*Students cannot receive credit for both FRN 352 and ENGL 100

Rationale: FRN352 was created for the Bilingual Option of the Bachelor of Nursing Program in order to replace ENGL100 and meet the requirement that 50% of the program's courses be taught in French. Subsequently, the Bac Program in the Faculty of Education implemented a change allowing its students to take either ENGL100 or FRN352 to fulfill program requirements. The French and Francophone Intercultural Studies (FFIS) Program is now making the same request. Students in the FFIS program will benefit from having the choice between ENGL100 and FRN352. FRN352 will appeal to those students wishing to improve their critical reading and writing skills in French.

## Motion 4: Change to BA Honours in French and Francophone Intercultural Studies Program

That the description of the BA Honours Program requirements be revised as follows: "Three other 200-level FRN courses (only one only two FRN 220 AA-ZZ can be included)". Effective 201920.

#### Information - Program description & requirements:

<u>BA Honours Major In French and Francophone Intercultural Studies</u> (page 306 online calendar/page 297 print calendar)

#### Requirements

The BA Honours program consists of a minimum of 120 credit hours and must include the following:

- All of the BA core requirements.
- A requirement of 51 credit hours in the major as determined by the
  Department of French and Francophone Intercultural Studies, including a minimum of 12 credit
  hours at the 400- level in not fewer than 3 courses. Students should check the calendar entry of
  the department concerned for specific requirements.
- An honours paper or comprehensive oral or written examination

#### **Special Regulations for Honours Programs**

Students who fail more than 9 credit hours after their first academic year (i.e., after the first 30 credit hours attempted) are not eligible to enter or complete an Honours program. If there are extenuating circumstances, they may appeal to La Cité to have this regulation waived. If the Committee grants the appeal, the student must still comply with all other regulations governing admission and graduation, and will be allowed no further failed courses.

## Centre for Teaching and Learning - Services for 2018 - 2019

## Dr. Kathryn Ricketts

#### **Approach**

Fundamentally the centre will be offering three tiers of service during this year.

- 1. Workshops, symposiums, courses and seminars.
- 2. Educational consultations (both scheduled and impromptu).
- 3. Partnered services i.e. Teaching Observations, New Faculty Mentorship, Dossier Partnering, and brokering Communities of Practice.

#### **Objective**

As an interim Co-ordinator of the Centre for Teaching and Learning I intend to deliver and maintain a range of programing including the following,

12 week certificate courses - U of R Graduate Student Teaching Certificate Program & U of R Teaching Certificate Program (Fall 2018 & Winter 2019).

Individual workshops (Fall 2018 & Winter 2019)

- 1. \* Learning Outcomes.
- 2. \* Assessment and Feedback.
- 3. \* Non-traditional Learning.
- 4. \* Social Media in the University Classroom & Information Literacy.
- 5. \* Conflict /Resolution/Health and Well being.
- 6. \* Indigenizing Curriculum (in partnership with the Office of Indigenization).
- 7. \* Graphic Notation Drawing to Learn.
- 8. \* Teaching Dossiers.
- 9. Tenure and Promotion Dossiers (in partnership with\_Vice-President, Research ).
- 10. Close Reading Techniques (in partnership with the Faculty of Education).
- 11. \* Presentation skills (in partnership with FGSR).
- 12. Clearing the Fog; organizing and strategizing multiple parts for facilitation or research writing (in partnership with UR Leading).
  - \*Part of the first hour of most of the U of R Graduate Student Teaching Certificate Program & U of R Teaching Certificate Program classes.

In addition to these workshops I will be

Delivering a five part workshop for Teaching Development Days – Anatomy of Best Practice Teaching (*Fall 2018*).

Coordinating the President's Teaching and Learning Scholars Program and showcasing these recipients in a scholarly event (Fall 2018 & Winter 2019).

Hosting ongoing communities of practice i.e. Graphic Notation, Engaging Large Classes (Winter 2019).

Conducting individual consultations with faculty and graduate students (Fall 2018 & Winter 2019).

Hosting and coordinating a national curriculum conference, "Provoking Curriculum", in partnership with Faculty of Education and Canadian Association of Curriculum Studies. (Fall 2018 – Spring 2019).

Fostering partnerships with key centres and organizations on campus, such as Office of Indigenization, Faculty of Graduate Studies and Research & UR Leading. As an example, Emily Grafton will offer her new on line course on Indigenizing Curriculum under the umbrella of CTL with three face to face workshops open to the university community (Fall 2018 & Winter 2019).

Conducting ongoing forums for consultation with a select group of representatives from across campus and from Luther, Campion and FNU (Fall 2018 & Winter 2019).

#### **Pilot Services**

The goal for Fall 2018 and Winter 2019 is to provide a rich array of services to the university community efficiently and within finite resources.

This should be attained whilst building profile and awareness of a vibrant and effective university centre. To this end I will develop pilot programming simultaneous to our established offerings as a means to measure interest and impact for future growth and development.

- Facilitate a Community of Practice with *Graphic Notation & Engaging Students in Large Class Formats.*
- Teaching Observations and Feedback.
- Facilitate senior to new Faculty Mentorship.

#### General

- Continue to develop new programming in response to faculty consultations.
- Update current website.
- Build a consultative community of university wide representatives (members of Faculties, Campus for All, UR Student International, Aboriginal Students Centre etc.).
- Review existing strategic plan with current review of the centre conducted by Alec Couros.
- Continue to develop the proposal for a centre vision and plan with concrete budget, including outline of personnel, on line profile, facility, programming and partnerships. This is done attending to the review conducted by Alec Couros in conjunction with faculty consultations.
- Join Society for Teaching and Learning in Higher Education (STLHE) and possibly join the board.
- Attend at least one conference attending to the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (Congress 2019, Vancouver with Laurie Clune, Nursing, highlighting her work as a recipient of the President's Teaching and Learning Scholars Program).

Finishing one article with Stephen Cheng, highlighting the innovative approaches to the U of R Graduate Student Teaching Certificate Program and U of R Teaching Certificate Program.
