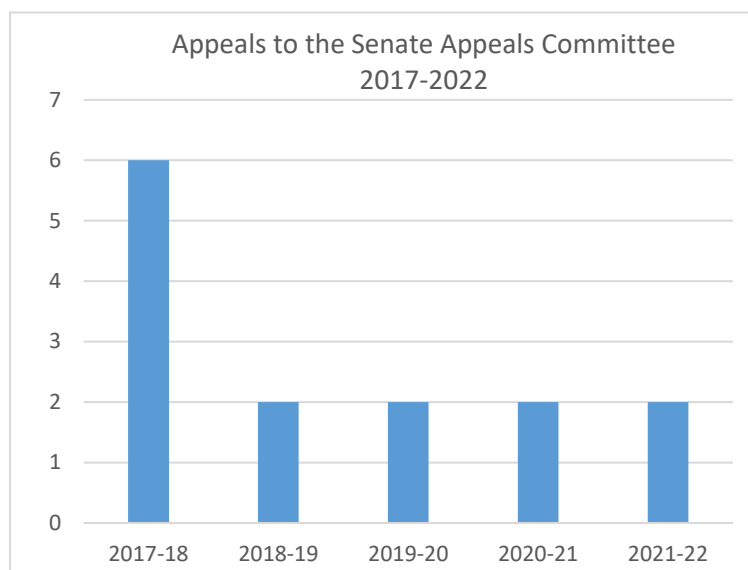
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**1. 2022 Elected Member of Senate to the Board of Governors**

**Background and Description:**

Dr. Art Opseth's second term as a member of Senate elected to the Board of Governors is set to expire on June 30, 2022. A call for nominations was issued at the October 2021 Senate meeting with a nomination deadline of May 25, 2022. One nomination was received: Adynea Russell has expressed interest in serving as the Elected Senate Member to the University of Regina Board of Governors. Therefore, Adynea Russell is declared elected by acclamation to serve from July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2025.

The Senate Appeals Committee is to act as an appeal tribunal for decisions of the Council Discipline Committee and the Council Committee on Student Appeals, in accordance with Section 33(1)(e) of the University of Regina Act.

The Committee will uphold the decision of the Committees being appealed from unless the appellant can demonstrate that the decision was contrary to the evidence presented or manifestly unfair to the appellant.

During the 2021-2022 academic year, the Senate Appeals Committee considered two (2) appeals. There is one (1) appeal pending for the Spring/Summer.

In its original decision, the Faculty found two instances of academic misconduct in a course – on a term test, and on the final exam. The Council Discipline Committee overturned the misconduct finding on the term test, but upheld the finding on the final exam. The Committee directed that the grade of 0 on the final exam be included in the calculation of the final course grade. 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**Rationale:**

- Rewritten for greater clarity.
- The requirement for applicants to be licensed in a Canadian jurisdiction moved to the beginning to eliminate applications from registered nurses who do not have Canadian licensure.

- Essay requirement replaced by a cover letter as essay has not been identified by faculty as reflective of student writing ability, and reading the essays is a labour-intensive process for the applications sub-committee.
- Removal of the practice experience as a registered nurse. Studies have identified:
  - that cumulative undergraduate GPA as well as GPA specific to nursing/scientific criteria are predictors of successful completion of NP programs and certification (licensure) exams whereas years of nursing practice are not a predictor of success;
  - there is no significant relationship between year of completion of a BSN program (years of experience) and success in the NP program; and
  - more recently, a study revealed that “Age was a negative predictor of on-time graduation,... finding supported by three articles in the nursing literature.

**Rationale:** The proposed certificate combines JSGS Non-profit Management Certificate offered exclusively at the University of Regina with the JSGS Certificate in Social Economy and Co-operatives offered exclusively at the University of Saskatchewan. The two certificates in their current form have many areas of overlap. Combining the two certificates would eliminate repetitions and create space for co-teaching/expertise sharing. Additionally, merging the two certificates would streamline course content, which will ultimately



'tidy up' our course offerings and make them more thematically focused. This process of course revision will emphasize skill creation rather than mere theoretical/policy considerations of the respective sectors. This merge also increases the value proposition and makes marketing for the proposed certificate more cost-effective. Finally, this merge further promotes the one-school approach with respect to utilizing the school's existing faculty complement at both campuses as outlined in the JSGS Strategic Plan.

*Note : L'approbation du Comité des études supérieures de La Cité vise à permettre aux étudiant.es fort.es en français mais ayant étudié en anglais d'accéder au programme sans test, suite à une entrevue ou sur foi de cours déjà suivis.*

This admission criteria change ensures that applicants from non-Francophone backgrounds who do not have experience in a Francophone environment are prepared to meet the linguistic challenges associated with their program of study.

*Note: The approval of La Cité's Graduate Studies Committee allows students who are fluent in French but who have studied in English to access the program without further testing based on an interview or courses already taken.*

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## 2. COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON UNDERGRADUATE ADMISSIONS AND STUDIES

### 2.1 FACULTY OF ARTS

#### 2.1.1 Faculty of Arts Admission Requirements – Revision

**MOTION:** To revise the Faculty of Arts admission requirements, effective 202230.

##### Arts Transition Program

- a. Students with GPAs\* 50.00-59.99% will be offered admission via the Arts Transition Program.
- b. Students with GPAs\* below 50.00% are not admissible to the Arts Transition Program except with permission from the Associate Dean (Undergraduate) or Designate.

\*GPA will be assessed using:

- AGPA: applicants who are new to the University of Regina are assessed on all recognized post-secondary courses attempted, or
- UGPA: applicants who have previously attempted 15 or more credit hours at the University of Regina are assessed using only their University of Regina grades.

**Rationale:** At the October 2020 Senate meeting, when the Arts Transition Program admission requirements were passed, students with GPA's below 50.00% became inadmissible to the Faculty of Arts.

There are some students who will decide to return to their studies after a lengthy time away because their personal circumstances have changed. Often a low academic average can be a result of turmoil, crisis, or personal situations rather than a lack of academic ability. If a student is required to withdraw from the University of Regina, they will have to sit out a minimum of two years, but after that time, if given another chance, a returning student may be eligible to apply for Fresh Start, or a new student may do very well compared to their previous attempts. Some examples of previous petitioning students and the outcome when accepted on petition:

1. An applicant applied to the University of Regina after attending the University of Saskatchewan and being required to withdraw and had an average below 50.00%. The student had outlined her challenges which included two miscarriages and emotional and physical stress that affected her studies. After a 14 year break, she had applied to come to the University of Regina, and outlined the changes in her life including having two children, a foster child, a supportive spouse, and employment that taught her to become and advocate for those who cannot speak for themselves. Returning to studies allowed this student to work towards her personal and career goals and become (in her words) "her better self." This student has now completed 84 credit hours and has a 79.00% UGPA.
2. An applicant applied to the University of Regina after attending the University of Alberta, and being required to withdraw had an average below 50.00%. This student outlined her challenges which included moving far from home, culture shock, lack of social life, lack of balanced support system, and lack of confidence. Her family was able to move closer to her, and she began to make friends and gain peer support. She recovered academically because she overcame her psychological difficulties and her fear of failure and started to return to studies with taking one course. She was able to continue her studies, and now has an 84.00% average at the University of Regina.
3. A more recent example (since new regulation was put in place): An applicant returned to the University of Regina after a requirement to withdraw and a 15 year break, but had an average below 50.00%. He had previously attended when he was 21 years old, and since that time, had become an Educational Assistant, a husband, and a father. He had reflected on his past decisions, wanted to set a good example

of his children, and was ready to return to academic pursuits, but with a 42.00% average from 15 years ago, he was not eligible for this opportunity.

**Rationale for all new economics certificates above (2.1.2 – 2.1.4):** For many years the Economics department has offered a highly subscribed Certificate in Economics (30 credit hour program) that provides non-economic majors with economics training on wide ranging issues. The program has been particularly popular with Business majors and with Science majors at the University of Regina.

Given the expertise of its faculty members, the department has developed and offered on regular basis a number of elective courses that are clustered around few fields of economics: development and trade, the environment and energy, as well as monetary theory and finance. We would like to take advantage of the recently approved framework for micro-credentials at the University of Regina and create these specialized certificates, at no additional faculty resources for delivering them.

The courses included in the proposed certificates examine very important and timely issues. As a result these specialized Economic Certificates provide great value for non-Economics major students with particular interests in development and international business, in the environment and energy related fields as well as in finance. In addition, individuals already working in the environment and energy sector or the development and trade could be potential mature students taking these programs on a part-time basis. The department offers the courses with sufficient frequency that will enable students to complete these certificates within a 12-month period, if they wish.

The department has consulted and received support from the Mathematics and Statistics department and Faculty of Business regarding the Certificate in Monetary and Financial Economics.

**Rationale:** Trade with other nations is a critical element of the Saskatchewan economy and has been identified as an important aspect of the province's Growth Plan. In addition, principled practices for internationalization create opportunities for exposure to different contexts and worldviews, enhanced capacity to responding to change, new forms of collaboration, and greater intercultural appreciation and knowledge. A micro-credential in international business builds upon existing opportunities in international business and studies currently offered within the Faculty of Business and across the U of R. The proposed Certificate in International Business is designed to be accessible to business students and to students outside the Faculty of Business Administration during the course of their degrees. For business students, the Certificate in International Business would be replacing the Major in International Business, which will be discontinued. Although the IB Major did fairly well when it was first introduced, its popularity subsequently declined and, at the May 4, 2018 Faculty Council meeting, this Major was put on an 18 month review, after which time it would be decided whether to continue it or not. (At that time a few adjustments were also made to the requirements for the Major.) Since then, the average number of students graduating with an IB Major has decreased further—to less than four graduates annually. We believe that replacing the IB Major with a Certificate in International Business with similar content will make this important subject matter accessible to more business students than previously, because it could be taken in combination with any major. For non-business students, the Certificate in International Business will provide a short program of international business studies not previously available to them. The Certificate in International Business could also be taken as a standalone credential. We anticipate that this new certificate will provide many students



with the knowledge to participate in and create international business opportunities in Saskatchewan and beyond, as well as develop a greater appreciation for the complexities of local-global connections.

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## 2.3 FACULTY OF ENGINEERING AND APPLIED SCIENCE

### 2.3.1 Petroleum Systems Engineering – Admissions Suspension

**MOTION:** To suspend admission for the Petroleum Systems Engineering Major at undergraduate level, effective 202230.

**Rationale:** The motion to suspend admission to the Petroleum Systems Engineering program at **undergraduate level** is a necessary step in the creation of the new Energy Systems Engineering (ERSE) program. High school students and undergraduate students transferring in from other faculties or outside Universities will be accepted into the first-year engineering general program and will qualify to transfer to the ERSE program as of 202330. **The Petroleum Systems Engineering Program at graduate level will remain.**

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### 2.3.2 Energy Systems Engineering Major – New Program

**MOTION:** To create the Energy Systems Engineering Major (ERSE), effective 202320.

**Rationale:** The Petroleum Systems Engineering (PSE) program has experienced declining undergraduate enrollment since the oil and gas industry’s downturn happened in 2015. The proposed Energy Systems Engineering program covers a broad category of engineering disciplines that deal with energy production, transportation, and storage. The Energy Systems Engineering program aims to serve the U of R’s strategic plan to “commit to climate action through development and research initiatives, as well as ecological and economic sustainability through responsible stewardship of the land and resources.”

Restructuring to Energy Systems Engineering is necessary to address the challenges that the PSE program is facing. The inclusive meaning of “energy” allows the current petroleum-focused curriculum to expand and incorporate more format of energy (such as wind, solar, nuclear, etc.). The resulting room for adjustments enables adapting to the fluctuating energy market sensitive to unforeseen social or political events. From the marketing point of view, the proposed Energy Systems Engineering program is more general and appealing to young generations.

No university in Canada offers an energy-related curriculum as comprehensive as the proposed Energy Systems Engineering program with three options:

- Petroleum Engineering
- Sustainable Energy Engineering
- Energy Transportation and Storage

The Energy Systems Engineering program targets to be the principal supplier of competent much-needed engineers to the national and international energy industry.

#### **Why do we need the Petroleum Engineering option?**

Canada's oil and gas industry will continue to play an essential role in the global energy market. The demand and supply for oil and gas will remain dominant in the coming decades despite the transition from fossil fuels to clean energy. The PSE program has developed a robust curriculum accredited by CEAB since 2003. It has equipped with rich and solid research capacity and competence, and most importantly, accumulated 20 years of experience in teaching Petroleum Engineering. As the world economy recovers from COVID-19, the oil and gas industry will face the challenge of recruiting engineers to fill new or vacant positions due to the lack of recent graduates. The PSE program's academic asset should remain available to fill this gap between the demand and supply of quality engineers and meet the mutual needs of industry and students.

#### **Why do we need the Sustainable Energy Engineering option?**

The global energy market is shifting from traditional fossil fuels to clean energy in response to the world's effort to achieve net-zero greenhouse gas emissions to address climate change. The International Energy Agency (2021) has recently reported that the net-zero emissions call for a rapid transition to clean energy throughout 2030. Current situation indicated the fast-changing environment of the energy industry towards clean energy. Therefore, the Sustainable Energy Engineering option is essential for cultivating future engineers in need, developing and enhancing the required clean energy technology, and increasing the undergraduate enrollment of the PSE program or EGSE program after restructuring.

#### **Why do we need the Energy Transportation and Storage option?**

With the increasing trend in energy transportation and storage in Saskatchewan and Canada, an undergraduate program from the specialized knowledge field will help the Faculty of Engineering & Applied Science to grow. Moreover, these new technologies attract increasing job demand for engineering graduates. Since no similar engineering programs are available, this new option will increase the demand and attract significant interest from the student communities.

#### **Proposed ERSE Curriculum Program Structure**

**Please note:** The term "option" is the language used by the Canadian Engineering Accreditation Board. For University purposes, "option" will be updated to "concentration" in the Undergraduate Calendar to align with the University of Regina's approved credential framework.

### **Bachelor of Applied Science in Energy Systems Engineering**

Energy Systems Engineering is a broad category of engineering that deals with energy production, transportation, and storage in the most efficient, economical, and environmentally friendly manner. It covers the conventional and unconventional forms of energy, including fossil fuels and sustainable energy resources, such as solar, wind, geothermal, hydro, and nuclear, etc. The interdisciplinary skills developed through the program facilitate the seamless transition into the future shape of energy. Energy Systems Engineers take the lead on sustainability and resolve highly complex energy problems our society faces.

#### **Petroleum Engineering Option**

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The Petroleum Engineering option evaluates, designs, and manages technologies in evaluating reserves, surface collection, and treatment facilities for oil and gas. Advanced computer utilization and automation combined with effective communications skills

are integrated within the program. Techniques developed for the recovery of petroleum can be applied to the extraction of other important minerals. Petroleum engineering option also focuses on activities such as pollution remediation and greenhouse gases control.

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### 2.4.2 Faculty of Science Admission Requirements – Revision

**MOTION 1:** To update the post-secondary admission requirements to the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Science Qualifying program such that the post-secondary admissions category applies to any student who has attempted a minimum of 15.0 credit hours, effective 202230.

**MOTION 2:** To update the minimum admissions average for Post-Secondary applicants to be calculated based on a maximum of the student's most recent 30 credit hours of approved courses. In cases where the AGPA on the most recent 30 credit hours of approved courses is less than 60%, admission to the Science Qualifying program will be considered based on a minimum AGPA of 60% on all approved post-secondary courses, effective 202230.

#### Science (U of R, Campion, FNUniv, or Luther)

Applicants who have attempted ~~24~~ 15 credit hours or more of approved post-secondary courses with a minimum Admissions Grade Point Average (AGPA) of 65% based on a maximum of their 30 most recent credit hours of approved courses, will be admitted directly to their major in the Faculty of Science.

Applicants must provide evidence of having completed course work in math and sciences at either the post-secondary or secondary school level.

#### **Program Specific Admission Requirement**

Science Qualifying	<p>Applicants who have attempted <del>24</del> <u>15</u> credit hours or more of approved post-secondary courses with an AGPA of 60-64.99% <u>(based on a maximum of their 30 most recent credit hours of approved courses)</u> OR who have not completed the indicated course requirements may be admitted as a Science Qualifying student.</p> <p><u>In cases where the AGPA on the most recent 30 credit hours of approved courses is less than 60%, admission to the Science Qualifying program will be considered based on a minimum AGPA of 60% on all approved post-secondary courses.</u></p>
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**Rationale:** Many applicants have attended multiple post-secondary institutions. We do not want to punish students for their past academic difficulties, if in the meantime they have been performing well. We currently look at all approved previous post-secondary work when calculating admission averages. Other universities only look at transferable courses or a certain number of credit hours. For example, University of Calgary uses



the past 30 credit hours, University of Alberta uses the past two terms if they contain at least 24 credit hours, and University of Toronto uses the most recent annual average.

The Honours in Statistics program will play an instrumental role in meeting the growing demand of the Canadian labour market for professional statisticians, and will ensure superior training and learning outcomes for all undergraduate students interested in pursuing postgraduate studies.

## 2.5 FACULTY OF SCIENCE/FIRST NATIONS UNIVERSITY OF CANADA

### 2.5.1 Bachelor of Science in Environmental Health and Science and Bachelor of Science in Environmental Health and Science After Degree – Program Deletion

**MOTION:** To delete (archive) the Bachelor of Science in Environmental Health and Science Program and the Bachelor of Science in Environmental Health and Science After Degree Program, effective 202320.

**Rationale:** Admissions to these programs have been suspended since 201920 (approved at the December 2018 CCUAS meeting). At that time, it was recommended that another motion to archive the program be submitted to CCUAS closer to the program completion deadline. The Bachelor of Science in Environmental Health and Science Program and the Bachelor of Science in Environmental Health and Science After Degree Program have always had a small number of students since they were first established and have never been financially sustainable programs. The First Nations University of Canada is no longer able to provide the necessary human resources and financial support to continue to offer these programs. The remaining students in the program have until April 30, 2023 to complete their degree and have been advised of the following: “We will not be offering ENHS 380 anymore. Students needing this course will complete INHS 300 to replace it in their program. Students registered in the ENHS After Degree program have received permission from the INHS 300 instructor to take the course without the INHS 210 prerequisite.”

## 2.6 LA CITE UNIVERSITAIRE FRANCOPHONE

### 2.6.1 Additional Information in the University Calendar

**MOTION:** Que la section “Admissions, Ré-admission, et Transfert” du University Calendar soit modifiée pour ajouter les deux paragraphes suivants.

**ENGLISH TRANSLATION:** That the section “Admission, Re-admission, and Transfer” of the University Calendar be updated, effective 202230.

Paragraphs to add to Admissions, Re-admission, et Transfert [after “Cours obsolètes” section]:

#### **Cours Obsolètes**

Tout étudiant, admis ou réadmis à La Cité et ayant terminé des cours de son éventuelle majeure il y a plus de dix (10) ans, peut avoir à remettre ses connaissances à jour en reprenant des cours ou en prenant des cours supplémentaires pour sa majeure. Tout cours réussi qui doit être repris en vertu de ce règlement peut compter comme crédit facultatif.

#### **Placement et transfert dans des cours de langue française**

Après avoir fait l'évaluation linguistique de La Cité, l'étudiant sera dirigé vers un cours correspondant à son niveau. Aux fins d'apprentissage et de réussite, et puisque les évaluations ne reflètent pas toujours les capacités, La Cité pourrait rediriger un étudiant vers un cours de niveau supérieur ou inférieur. Il est possible d'obtenir une équivalence ou un transfert de crédits pour certains cours ou programmes, mais aucune équivalence et aucun transfert ne seront accordés pour l'atteinte de la compétence en français. Les étudiants placés à un niveau supérieur aux cours de français offerts (par ex., FRN 301) devront s'inscrire à un nombre équivalent de cours FRN pour répondre aux exigences de leur programme. Aucun cours offert à La Cité ne peut faire l'objet d'une revendication de crédits.

#### **Exigence minimale de résidence**

Pour tous les programmes, les étudiants doivent obtenir au moins la moitié de leurs crédits à l'Université de Regina. Dans certains cas, les étudiants devront peut-être obtenir plus que le nombre minimal d'heures-crédits à l'Université de Regina.

Les étudiants inscrits au BA/BEEd en collaboration avec le Baccalauréat en éducation française doivent normalement faire au moins la moitié de la partie BA de leur programme, ainsi que la moitié des cours FRN obligatoires, à l'Université de Regina. Les étudiants inscrits dans les programmes de La Cité peuvent suivre des cours dans d'autres établissements postsecondaires en obtenant la permission à l'avance.

Paragraphs to add To Admissions, Re-admission, and Transfer: [at the end of this section]

#### **Stale-Dated Courses**

Students who are admitted or re-admitted to La Cité, having completed courses in their proposed major more than 10 years ago, may be required to update their knowledge by repeating or taking additional courses in their major. These decisions are made by the recommendation of the head of the department offering the major or program. The earlier attempt at any passed courses that must be repeated under this regulation can be counted for elective credit.

**Placement and Transfers into French language courses**

Upon taking La Cité's placement test, students will be directed to register in a course at the appropriate level. Given that placement test results do not always correspond to a student's ability, La Cité may direct a student to register in a course at a higher or lower level to ensure their learning and success. Transfer credits or equivalences may be granted for specific courses or programs, but will not be granted for having achieved French proficiency. Students placed beyond the existing language courses (e.g. FRN 301) will be required to take the equivalent number of FRN courses to complete the requirements of their program. No courses at La Cité may be challenged for credit.

**Residency Requirements**

For all programs, students must complete at least half of all credits at the University of Regina. Students may be required to do more than the minimum number of credit hours at the University of Regina.

Students registered in the BA/BEEd in collaboration with the Baccalauréat en éducation française must normally complete at least half of the BA part of the program, as well as half of the required FRN courses, at the University of Regina. Students in programs with La Cité may complete courses at other post-secondary institutions by obtaining permission in advance.

**Justification/Rationale:**

Les règles liées au placement dans les cours de langue et à la possibilité de transférer les étudiant·es vers un autre cours au besoin ne sont pas présentées dans le calendrier universitaire. Ces règles (1) officialisent la pratique et (2) créent la possibilité d'un transfert pour trouver un cours de langue approprié pour un·e étudiant·e à l'intérieur des délais habituels pour ajouter des cours.

Par ailleurs, la règle de résidence à l'Université n'est pas présente dans la section du calendrier de La Cité. Cette règle officialise la pratique déjà en place.

The rules in regards to the placement in language courses and the possibility of transferring students to another course if necessary are not evident in the University Calendar. These rules (1) formalize the practice and (2) create the possibility of a transfer to an appropriate language course for a student within the usual deadlines for adding courses.

In addition, the Residency Requirements at the University are not present in La Cité's section of the calendar. This formalizes the practice already in place

### 2.7.1 English Language Proficiency Test – Duolingo Test

**MOTION:** That the Duolingo Online English Test with a minimum score of 110 be *extended* as an accepted approved test of proficiency in English for undergraduate admissions, on a temporary basis effective immediately. This test is currently being used for the 2021-2022 academic year (July 1, 2021 to April 30, 2022).

#### What is Duolingo English Test?

The Duolingo Online English Test is an English proficiency test that can be taken online, on-demand, in under one hour for \$49 USD. Certified result are available within 48 hours of the test session and applicants can request Duolingo to send their results directly to our admission office. **Rationale:** Accepting Duolingo’s online English test will allow the University of Regina to be as accessible as other Canadian universities are using Duolingo, and will help students in applying for admission to the U of R. Currently, the University of Regina is accepting Duolingo’s online English test on a temporary basis for the 2021-2022 academic year. Students that have provided the Duolingo Online English Test as their proof of English Language Proficiency prove to have similar UGPAs to those that have taken an IELTS exam to meet the English Language Proficiency:

The sample size is small at this time. Extending the use of the Duolingo Online English Test for an additional academic year will provide a larger sample size. 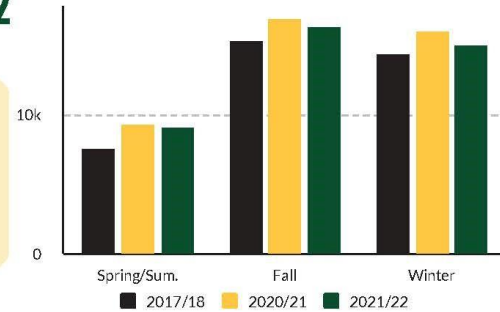

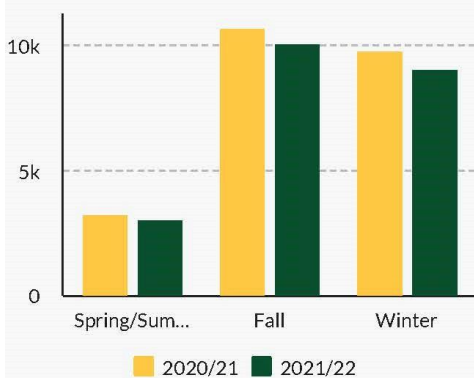

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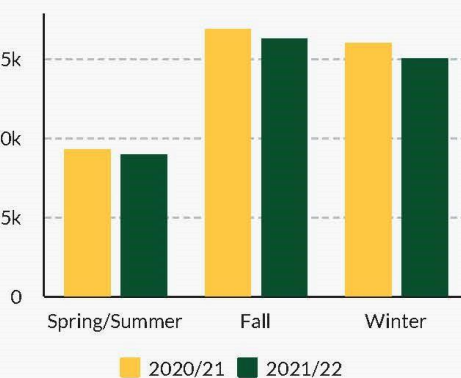

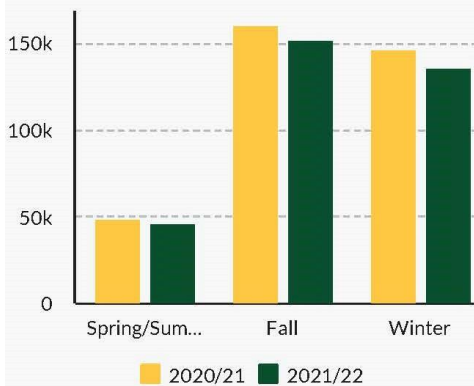

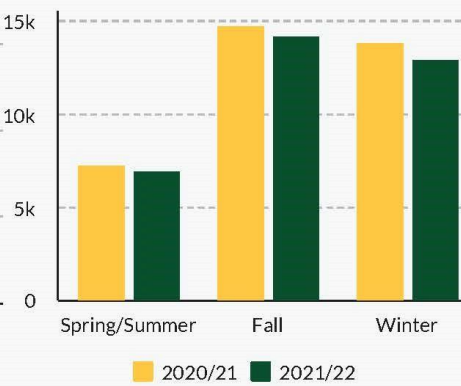

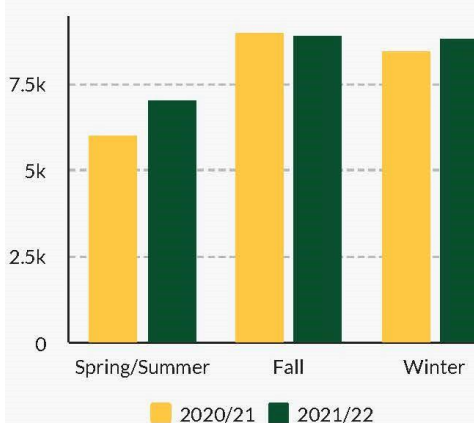
Undergraduate Credit Hours Summary



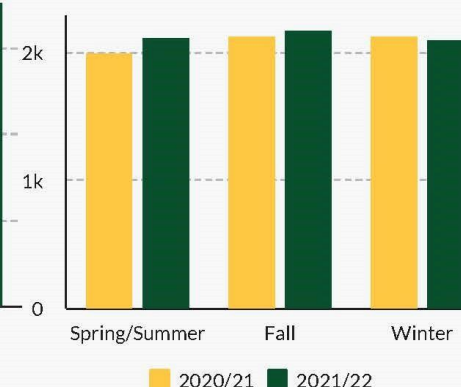
Undergraduate Student Headcount Summary



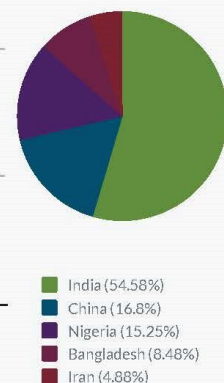
Graduate Credit Hours Summary
