Welcome to the 13th 11th semi-annual Terrible Film Festival event. This event showcases 16mm films created as part of a film production class at the University of Regina where I have the students process their own film in buckets in the darkroom. This system forces them to give up much of the control they are accustomed to having when working with digital media and instead must rely on their ability to respond to the chaos of the liquids and mistakes of exposure. Many things on the screen will be the culmination of a few weeks of experimentation trying to build an image or an idea onto a piece of celluloid where the darkroom-fates deemed there was no image to be found. The films are mostly short, between a minute and two each, with sound being an option. The event, being live, will allow you as an audience to see aspects of the work which will certainly not survive beyond this night. This is about the art of mistakes and about the improvisation of exhibition. I ask only that you try to not get caught up in previous expectations of what a movie is but instead to enjoy the films in the moment.

You'll see the use of the technique of writing text on the film to reflect upon the already selfreflexive content. The idea is that the text will parallel the viewer's own thoughts about what they're seeing and will act as a sort of verfremdungseffekt. There's also a cat.
